## “Good and Evil Within Us — Reflections for Bodhi Day”

In traditional kabuki theater, performances often featured symbolic characters representing “Good” and “Evil.”

Old woodblock prints often depicted these figures in dynamic, dance-like poses, each with a large character on the chest—one reading “Good,” the other “Evil.”

They face one another boldly, almost as if engaged in a spirited dance.

People enjoyed these images because they expressed something universal: the inner tug-of-war we all experience. Human hearts are complex.

Someone who seems selfish may suddenly show deep kindness.

Someone admired for their goodness may act harmfully in a moment of weakness.

Good and troubled impulses rise and fall within us moment by moment.

No one is entirely one or the other.

This month, we observe **Bodhi Day**, the day Shakyamuni Buddha attained awakening. According to tradition, as he sat beneath the Bodhi tree, “demons” appeared and tried to obstruct his enlightenment. But these demons were not external beings. They were the shadows of fear, doubt, pride, and craving—arising from within his own heart.

By recognizing them clearly and refusing to run away, the Buddha opened the path to enlightenment.

As the year comes to an end, we may also notice the “soot” that has accumulated in our hearts:

fatigue, irritation, regret, or quiet worries. We cannot sweep them away perfectly. But we can gently acknowledge them through reflection.

That honest recognition becomes our own **inner year-end cleaning**.

May we close this year with gratitude,  
and with hands together,  
whisper *Namo Amida Butsu* in our hearts—  
the words of thanks that remind us we are embraced just as we are.

## **President's Message**

We had such a wonderful time hosting Rev. Henry Adams over the November 22<sup>nd</sup> weekend. Our Dharma discussion with Rev. Adams was very well attended. The discussion was stimulating and informative. We even had visitors from other temples as well. We followed up with a very well attended Sunday service, again with visitors from other temples. Rev. Adams, one of the most accomplished Dharma speakers in the BCA, gave a wonderful Dharma message. I learned a lot about Rennyō that I didn't know before. This format will be followed this month when Rev. Jay Shinseki will be our guest on the December 6-7 weekend. We again will have a Dharma discussion on Saturday at 4:30 – 6:00 and then have the privilege of hearing Rev. Shinseki give the Bodhi Day message on Sunday.

Rev. Majima would like to keep this kind of format for future guest speakers, so when she asks for a Sunday guest speaker to come, we hopefully will have the opportunity to have an informal Saturday Dharma discussion, as our schedule permits. Rev. Majima is also trying to coordinate the Dharma school schedules so that the Dharma schools of Reedley, Parlier and Fowler will hold their

Dharma school services on different Sundays of the month so that Dharma school students will have an opportunity to go to Dharma school every Sunday at different temples. The logistics will need to be worked out as to the schedule of each temple.

After the first of the year, we will be scheduling service twice a month, one service will be our Shōtsuki, our observance of the Buddhist holiday that month, and Dharma school, and the other will be a family service with Tokudo or lay speakers and Dharma school. The family service will resurrect the adult Dharma school class as well.

We are still planning for our Food Bazaar on February 21, 2026. It was determined that District 4 will be chairing the bazaar. Be prepared to attend the initial planning meeting whenever District 4 sets the meeting date. The election of FBC officers has been postponed until the next meeting.

Affiliate church organizations are keeping busy. The Golf Club will continue to schedule monthly tournaments at different courses. They treated our Sangha to delicious Loco Moco at our November service. The BWA is busy planning for their Bonenkai on December 13<sup>th</sup> and planning the CCBWA conference on March 22<sup>nd</sup>.

The Dharma School is helping the CC chapter to host the BCA FDSTL conference in April 18<sup>th</sup> in Fresno. Ken Ishimoto may begin Yoga instructor training early next year and may eventually be certified to offer Yoga locally in the later part of 2026.
